Squirrels & Hedgehogs Home Tasks

The activities below are all based around the story The Three Little Pigs. Please read the story powerpoint that we have added on the website or the You Tube story https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=HtHjB6rRmQc before you start the activities. If you have your own story of The Three Little Pigs please feel free to read that too. Children in school Monday & Tuesday will have the story read to them.

Maths

- Please visit the website: https:// www.thenational.academy/online-classroom/ reception#schedule and work through lessons 1-5 around 'Shape, Space & Measure'. Children who are in school Monday -Tuesday will do lessons 1 and 2 with their teacher at school. Children in school Thursday-Friday will do lessons 4 and 5 with their teacher.
- Collect some sticks from outside. Can you put them in order from the shortest to the longest? Can you find something longer than the longest stick? Can you find something shorter than the shortest stick? Take a picture when you have finished.
- Pick your favourite 5 toys and line them up next to each other. Pick the toy that you think is the tallest, then pick the toy that you think is the smallest. Why did you pick these? Explain to a family member why your chosen toys are taller/smaller than the others.
- Use some chalk to measure how tall you are on an outside wall. Ask your brother, sister, mum and dad to measure how tall they are too. Who is the tallest? Who is the shortest?
- Missing numbers activity on website.

Physical Development

- Don't forget all the good website links for Physical activity ideas that we put on the Online Resources Page on the website the other week.
- Practise throwing and catching a ball with a member of your family. Can you catch the ball with both hands? Can you catch it with just one hand? How many times can you catch and throw the ball without it touching the floor?
- Play hide and seek with a family member—you can do this inside or out in the garden.

Communication & Language

- Make a puppet show about the Three Little Pigs and perform it to someone in your family.
- Hide some treasure somewhere in the house. Try to give a member of your family clues to find the treasure without telling them exactly where it is. Can you give them clear instructions or hints? Did they manage to find the treasure? Ask them to hide the treasure and give you hints to find it. Did you manage to find it?
- Can you tell a grown up the story of The Three Little pigs? Try to use different voices for each character.

<u>Literacy — Reading & Writing</u>

- Carry on reading books on Bug Club.
- Carry on using the weekly Phonics plan uploaded to the website. Sessions 1 and 2 on the Phonics plan will be done at school if your child is returning to school for Monday-Tuesday. Sessions 2 and 3 will be done at school if your child is returning Thursday -Friday.
- Can you write your own story of The Three Little Pigs? Use some bordered paper from Twinkl if you want or write it in your green books. There is also a story sequencing page if you want to use that instead. Don't forget to use some of the story language in your writing.

Expressive arts & design

- Design your dream house. How many rooms does it have? What is in each room? Who will live in your dream house?
- Can you make a den in the garden? What kind of materials could you use to make the den? Make sure there is some shade in your den.
- Build a house for the three little pigs using materials you think would make a strong house. Try to blow over your house. Did it fall over? What did you make it out of? See build a house activity on website.

Understanding The World

- With the help of an adult, research where pigs and wolves live. Do they live in houses? What do they like to do? What do they like to eat? Can you make a fact file with all the information on? You can find fact file template on Twinkl.
- Go for a walk with family and use a camera or phone to takes some photographs. When you get home, you could look back at the different pictures that have been taken and talk about them.
- Three pigs Science investigation instructions on website. Have a go and let us know the results.

There are lots of ideas, templates & activities on Twinkl based on The Gingerbread Man —we have listed a few above but the list is endless. Please have a look and dip into anything you think your child might like to do. Also don't be afraid to do other things that you might think of that maybe linked to The Gingerbread Man.
